

Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program

About the Program

The Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP) helps low-income young adults build career paths, find employment, and break the cycle of poverty. CCMEP services are specifically tailored to each individual.

From July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019 there were 3,048 participants who received training services in Ohio.

One-Year Outcomes


One year after their last CCMEP service, 65% of CCMEP-served young adults were employed in Ohio, including full-time, part-time, and seasonal work. Of all who were employed, median annual earnings were \$18,100. Workers were most commonly employed in the Accommodation and Food Services, Administrative/Support/Waste Management/Remediation Services, and Health Care and Social Assistance industries.

During their exit period and in the following year, 15% of people who left CCMEP in 2018/19 were enrolled in a public Ohio college.

Employment Over Time

The charts below display employment patterns across a 3 year time period. For those whose CCMEP services ended in 2017/18 or 2018/19, employment in Ohio reached 77% 3 months after services and declined to 58% 33 months after services. Median annual earnings rose from \$16,000 3 months after services to \$20,400 36 months after services. Declining employment beginning at the 12 month and 24 month points coincide with the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic for people whose services ended in 2018/19 and 2017/18, respectively.

In the three years after leaving CCMEP, 58% to 77% of people were employed (Statewide, Overall).

Annual Earnings



In the three years after leaving CCMEP, employed individuals earned \$16,000 to \$20,400 per year (Statewide, Overall).
